#### Quality of Education: S. Banfield, Vice Principal

In September the college launched its new Framework for Learning. This framework is used across all faculties and works to ensure consistency of teaching and learning for all our young people.

The framework follows a pattern of learning that embeds direct teacher instruction, guided practice and independent work.

Our framework also supports the consistency of learning language and we have created a student framework that helps our young people understand their responsibility in the lesson and in their own learning. All students have received support and guidance on the framework, and this will continue with assemblies after half term. Both frameworks are featured below.

#### **Parent and Family Consultation Evenings**

After consultation with parents and families last year we are trialling a combined approach to our consultation evening this year.

Some will be face to face in the College and others will follow a hybrid model of face-to-face slots and also online slots. The hybrid evenings will last for three hours, as in previous years.

The face-to-face session will be in the first three hours and the online sessions in the final hour. All sessions will be booked via the school cloud booking system. Details will be sent out for your appropriate year group.

#### **Parent and Family Information Evenings**


The rationale for our new evenings is 'how can we help you to help your child'.


The first of our new information evening took place on Wednesday 18th October with the focus on:

Attendance Update: D. White, Assistant Principal

We would really like to thank all our families for their support in our effort to maintain good pupil attendance to school. We strive to work with our pupils and families to ensure that every child attends school as much as possible. This is essential for pupils to get the most out of their school experience, including their attainment, wellbeing, and wider life chances. (DFE, 2022)

At Okehampton College we celebrate and reward good attendance. Your child's tutor regularly checks your child's attendance and will award achievement points to pupils maintaining good attendance (97% and above), and to those pupils that have improving attendance.

At the end of each half term we celebrate those pupils that have 100% attendance for that half term period. We repeat this at the end of each of the three terms and at the end of the academic year. This is through our Year group celebration assemblies.

We are committed to developing positive, open, and effective communication between home and school. In order to do this, we will regularly be communicating with families about their child's attendance in several ways, including;

- Regular attendance focus on newsletters to share important information and updates.
- Every parent/carer will be informed about their child's attendance by email, twice each half term. We would really appreciate your support in talking to your child about their attendance and celebrating with them when they have consistently been in school every day, or when they have tried really hard to improve their attendance.
- Your child's tutor will contact families to ensure everything is OK and offer support following any unauthorised absence. This includes longer term absence or after 3 incidents of absence within a 4-week period.
- In line with our policy, parents/carers will receive letters regarding their child's attendance should it fall beneath 95%. Where attendance is below 90% and either the family or school has identified areas that need additional support, an attendance meeting will be arranged. In partnership with the school and family, personalised and achievable targets for pupils will be developed, based on their individual needs and circumstances.
- Parents/Carers will be informed twice a year about the process for requesting absence during term time and the processes involved should

- an absence not be considered an exceptional circumstance.
- The school level appendix of the Trust attendance policy contains details of relevant staff members who you can contact to discuss any concerns you may have regarding your child's attendance, please do not hesitate to contact us so as we can support where possible.

I wish all our pupils an enjoyable half term break.

### Open Evening

On Wednesday 4th October we opened our doors to Year 4, Year 5 and Year 6 families within our community. It was a fabulous evening where each of our faculties showed off their passion and expertise for their subjects. Our wonderful student volunteers helped each subject area to promote their favourite subject and we had some amazing Year 7 students who spoke about their experiences so far at Okehampton College, as well as a Year 13 student who is at the end of their journey with us. It was lovely to welcome so many families in to our College, to meet them and to show them our school and our students who were such a credit to us. #### Personal Development: B. Hachipuka, Assistant Principal

We started the term with the first cycle of Student Voice through tutor time and Student Councils, asking students for

their views on Enrichment, Canteen and the School Environment. A summary of these findings will be shared with school and home after half term.

Student Leadership has started strongly with Year 11 Prefects developing their skills at our Year 4, 5 and 6 open evening alongside our future Year 7 Transition Leaders who shared their experiences so far with families. The Year 7 and 8 Eco Warriors are meeting regularly making an action plan for the WOW project (War on Waste) which is a very exciting move towards ensuring we are an eco friendly school.

On Tuesday 31st November we have Humanutopia coming in for their second year ofr work with us as a college, where they will be delivering a day's workshop with Year 9. The workshop focuses on personal goals, self esteem, bullying issues and on the cohort as a whole whilst discussing how they can move forward together positively. The students who wish to train as Year 9 Heroes will apply and then attend a day's training on Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> November, where some of last years Heroes will support and share their experiences as a Leader.

The Pride Alliance group and Youth Cultural Champions have met to discuss their way forward this year and 6 Post-16 students have been trained as Mental Health Ambassadors and as part of World Mental Health day delivered our Mental Health assemblies.



Year 8 Transition Leaders have been supporting Year 7s through their allocation of a tutor group which involves them dropping in on a Monday and Tuesday morning. As they get to know their tutor group, some Year 7s may benefit from being mentored by the Year 8 Leaders. The Year 8s will also be part of the application process for the new Year 7 Transition Leaders which is very exciting as already we have many Year 7s who want to step into their shoes!

We have offered an extensive extra curricular programme to our young people with the aim of encouraging every student to take part in at least one activity each term, whether that be within the Arts, PE or Technology faculty. As you can see below, the programme offers opportunities within all of our faculty areas.

Finally we have been working hard to confirm our Enrichment week offer for July 8th - 12th; ensuring we have a variety of day, residential and in-school activities students can choose from. As a college we very much look forward to this end of year activities week and it is a great opportunity to experience new experiences, new cultures and make new friends. The finalised programme will be sent out to all families after half term.


It's been an exciting first term in English and we would like to congratulate our students for their hard work and motivation,


despite the darkening days! We rolled out a new initiative across Years 7-10 with a 'Fast Read' of their respective texts: Medusa by Jessie Burton, Animal Farm by George Orwell, The Woman in Black by Susan Hill and An Inspector Calls by J.B. Priestley. The aim of the Fast Read is to embed explicit teaching of academic vocabulary, and to develop reading fluency and comprehension. We have been really pleased by students' engagement with these texts and look forward to their responses as we move to analytical and creative writing. A particular highlight has been Year 10 students' ideas around An Inspector Calls: Eric and Mrs Birling always incite quite a strong response!


I would like to give a special mention to our Year 11s who have had an exceptional start to their final GCSE year. We commend their focus and commitment in the run-up to this set of mock exams. I felt very proud to see their positive attitude as they entered the exam hall last week, and was pleased to receive many compliments from the invigilators on their hard work during the exam. On to Macbeth next!

#### **Book Club:**

Last year, we introduced Book Club lessons in Years 7, 8 and 9 to complement our curriculum, broaden students' background knowledge and help to develop their oracy skills. This is a real highlight of our week: encouraging students to discuss texts holistically and explore their personal responses. This term, Year 7 are reading Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief by Rick Riordan alongside their work on Greek mythology; Year 8 are reading The Hunger Games by Suzanne Collins to deepen their understanding of dystopian fiction; Year 9 are reading Shakespeare by Bill Bryson to give them a solid grounding in Shakespearean context before they look at Romeo and Juliet later this year.







Year 7 are currently having their introduction to one of the most important, and fun, branches of maths that is Algebra. All maths teachers love this topic and it extends across the key stages where students' skills are revisited and built on each year.

Did you know that algebra was first used nearly 4000 years ago in 1900 BC? Ancient Babylon and Egypt are the two places that were at the centre it's development. Both of these civilizations used algebra in different ways and for different reasons, but it's generally accepted that it was the Babylonians who first made basic use of algebra and pioneered its beginnings in the field of mathematics. It was then further developed by Greek mathematicians and then by Arabic mathematicians. French mathematician and philosopher, Rene Descartes, introduced the cartesian plane with the x and y coordinates, in the early 17th Century, which are prevalent in modern-day algebra.

## ...Faculty Updates...

This Half Term Key Stage 3 students have been completing their first Invasion Games and Fitness Units. They have worked really well to develop their skills and then

incorporate these into games or more competitive situations. Students have been assessed via the three strands of the PE curriculum: A- Ability; B- Brain and C- Community.

We have been really impressed by students Community strand this half term with students being really supportive of their peers and assisting teachers with equipment to help lessons run smoothly showing excellent leadership and team work qualities.

In the final week of this half term all KS3 students will participate in an inter-tutor cross country competition, during one of their PE lessons, and results will be shared through the tutor system.

The first DMAT Central Venue league tournaments took place in Rugby and Football on Tuesday 17<sup>th</sup> October, and we also look forward to taking students out to represent us at Table Tennis and Cross Country, Indoor Cricket and Football at District, County and National levels next half term.

Key Stage 4 students who are undertaking BTEC Tech awards in Sport and Dance at Year 11 are currently undergoing their formal controlled assessments, and will complete this work by Friday 3rd November.

Languages

The Year 10 GCSE Languages cohort has started the new French curriculum. In Key Stage 3, we focused on talking about ourselves (describing our house, our family, our free-time, our school...).

In Key Stage 4, we change our approach, and try to focus on the world we live in. As Harriet says, "we study 'up to date topics, that are useful in life". Sienna adds 'You can pick up a French paper and understand it'.

After the first half-term, students are now able to engage in conversation about social issues, describing problems in their region and how to solve them. Next half-term, students will be able to talk about the environment and what we need to do to protect it.

Rachel thinks the lessons in KS4 are better, because they are more structured, and more relevant to the ever-changing world we live in. As we approach half term, all of our students are preparing for their first end of topic tests in science (except Year 11 who are sitting their mock exams). For many this will be a familiar time but for Year 7s we are using lessons to help them prepare by revising the Energy topic and looking at exam-style questions, so they know what to expect. So, what is an effective way to revise? Here are some of the science faculty's top tips for effective revision:

- Know what topics you need to revise. Ask your teacher for a list of topics or look at the retrieval questions set for home learning to remind you.
- Find a quiet place to study.
- Switch off your phone so you don't get distracted by any apps like Snapchat!!
- Break up your topics into small chunks. Revising for 20 – 30 minutes is plenty if you repeat this several times over the week!

#### **Revision strategies:**


There is no "right way" to revise but it is worth remembering that revision is not just reading your notes or text books. Try different strategies and see which works best for you. Here are some suggestions:

- Flash cards: turn your notes into small diagrams/cards of they key facts. Make sure to read these often (e.g., on the bus on the way home!) Get friends or parents/ carers to test you on these.
- Make a mind-map poster linking together key words and facts. You can annotate with diagrams to help. Display these around the house so you can look at them often.
- Use revision websites like www. senecalearning.com or BBC Bitesize quizzes to test your knowledge.
- Use YouTube revision videos (especially at GCSE level).

Most of all keep calm. Tests are not there to trick you; they are to see how much you have learnt! Good Luck!





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
