

## Learning Support offer Exam Breakfasts



The Learning Support Team secured funding from Okehampton PTFA to provide breakfasts for any Year 11 student who does not have exams in the main hall.

We ran this during the mock exams which took place last week and this week in preparation for the real exams in May/June.

The Year 11 breakfasts started a few years ago, when we identified that those Year 11 students who take exams in small groups or in individual rooms did not receive the comradery from their peers and support from teachers before their exams that the other students did because they had to find their way to individual rooms.

Learning Support came up with the idea to provide, hot drinks, juice, croissants, chocolate croissants, breakfast bars and fruit for any student in the Learning support building if they had a morning exam.

During this year's mocks, we found that out of the 50 students invited, we had about 15 students each day who enjoyed the support from the Learning Support team to find their exam rooms, ensure they had the right equipment and to help alleviate any last minute nerves before sitting their mocks. I believe this helped the students to take the mocks seriously and those students who attended really appreciated this support. All of the students said that they felt this would help them prepare for the real thing.

Every student who is eligible to join the Year 11 exam breakfast group received a letter of invitation before half term for the mocks. This invitation is extended to their actual exams beginning in May. If the student has an exam in the morning, they can come along to Learning Support room 633 from 8.30am until 8.55pm and can be registered with us. In addition, the Learning Support team provide revision sessions in tutor time for these Year 11 students in the Learning Support building on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

A big thank you should go to Okehampton College PTFA for their financial support to make this possible. We recognise how important it is for our students to receive a good breakfast and a calm environment before their exams. There is strong evidence to show that this can improve results in their exams and goes a long way towards their wellbeing.

Below is an account of the trip from Post 16 student Becky Rowe.



Firstly I would like to say a massive thank you to Mrs Berry, Mrs Teixeira and Mr Stevens for leading the trip, but especially Mrs Berry for organising it all.

When Sunday morning came, I was feeling very apprehensive about the long journey ahead of us, but everybody on the trip made it so enjoyable and I knew that it was going to be a fantastic week. We arrived in Mumbai in the early hours of Monday morning and jumped on the bus to our accommodation. It was from this moment on that we were already experiencing Indian life. Throughout the whole week we met incredible people, members of staff at the Muktangan schools, who made us all feel very welcome, Liz and Sunil Mehta, the founders of Muktangan, the children in all the schools and generally the people of India themselves.

The whole week was incredible and I learnt a lot about appreciating the small things we take for granted here, that in India, they do not have. For example, having a toilet in school and not having to go in a

hole in the ground! Not only this, but how they all make the most out of what they have.

On Thursday we visited Dharavi Slum, which I can say on behalf of everyone, was certainly an eye opener for us all. Before visiting the slum, I had impressions that it was ridden with crime and anti-social behaviour and high unemployment. Oh how wrong could I have been! Each alleyway we were taken down, was full of hard working people, whether they were sorting plastics which they had collected from the street of Mumbai, or making leather bags to sell in the shop. Everyone was working and were friendly letting us look into their little businesses to see what they were getting up to. Visiting the schools and delivering lessons had to be the highlight of the week for me. To see the smile on the children's faces and laughter coming from them, showed the enjoyment they were having. They were all amazed to see English people and were so engaged in the lessons we were delivering. We left some sport and art equipment for

them to use, so hopefully some of the games we taught them whilst we were there, they can continue playing with their new equipment. They asked us questions about British life, including asking if I knew 'Elizabeth' (The Queen), and the type of weather we get here. To us, it is all small things, but to them it was fascinating and they were so intrigued to see pictures of the snow we had recently had.

The week went so quickly however, in the few days we were there, we learnt so much about Indian Culture and I am so glad this trip happened for us all to experience something totally different to what we're used to. It is a place I certainly want to return to!!

Once again thank you to the staff and everyone who supported the trip in anyway including attending our fundraising events to make this trip possible, as it is an experience I will never forget.

We are delighted to inform you that in September 2019 Okehampton College will have a new College uniform. The decision for change is an exciting one following 18 months of consultation involving parents, students, staff and governors. There has been significant positive support from all representatives in our College community for this change. # Frequently Asked Questions

## When is the new uniform being introduced?

September 2019

## Who will wear the new uniform?

The new uniform will be mandatory for Years 7 – 9 from September 2019. It will be optional for Years 10 and 11. However, they should wear all new or all old uniform not a combination of both. Moving forward the new uniform will replace the current uniform for all years.

## When will the uniform be available to buy?

Both of our suppliers will have stock from 1<sup>st</sup> July 2019.

## How can the new uniform be purchased?

We have two approved suppliers: Thomas Moore, Exeter (in store and online) and Donalds Menswear, Okehampton (in store only).

## Can students take their blazer off in lessons?

Yes, with permission from the class teacher.

## How do I clean the blazer?

The blazer is machine washable.

## Why are there different ties?

The tie is navy with a coloured stripe. The colour of the stripe will be the colour of your child's House. (purple, red, yellow, blue, green).

## Can I buy trousers elsewhere?

Yes, as long as they are approved by a member of the Senior Leadership Team at the College. Please bring any alternative trousers to us to approve before removing any tags etc (in case they are not acceptable). We will endorse any acceptable trousers with the Okehampton College uniform stamp to avoid confusion. We advise you do this before the end of the summer term. Only approved and endorsed trousers are acceptable.

## Is a polo shirt acceptable?

No, it must be a white collared shirt/blouse in order for the tie to fit. The shirt/blouse can be long or short sleeve and must be worn tucked in.

## What happens to the old uniform?

We will be supporting a recycle scheme and any money raised from this will be used to support local charities. Further details to follow in the Summer term.

## Is the PE kit changing?

No, the PE kit remains the same. College P.E kit expectations can be found on the College website.

## What help is there financially?

The College will be offering a uniform loan scheme and this will be available through an application process. The first step will be to contact your child's Head of House. A brief application form will need to be completed and once this is approved can be used in store at either supplier.

## Can girls wear trousers?

Yes, our approved suppliers will be able to advise you on which trousers are acceptable.

## Can students wear shorts?

Yes, our approved suppliers will be able to advise you on which shorts are acceptable.

## What are acceptable school shoes?

Completely black, smart school shoes. No trainers or boots are allowed.

## Can Hoodies be worn?

No. Hoodies are not part of our uniform.

Okehampton College demands a high standard of appearance and dress and all students are required to wear the College uniform. Blazers must be worn to all lessons, as well as on the way to and from College, except when students have been given permission otherwise i.e. outdoors at lunchtimes or by teachers in lessons. Parental cooperation is essential if we are to maintain this high standard.

In order to ensure high standards and expectations with the uniform are met our practices and procedures are as follows:

- Staff will meet and greet students on arrival to the College and will be challenged if expectations are not met. However, immediate support will also be offered at the start of the day.
- Tutors will carry out inspections during morning registration. Students who have not met the uniform expectations will be sent to their Head of House and/or a member of the Senior Leadership Team. The College will offer support to students if any uniform issues arise.
- Spare uniform will be lent to students who are not wearing the correct uniform. Students will be expected to wear this uniform if they arrive to College having not met the uniform expectations.
- Where there are genuine reasons why students are not in the correct uniform students will be supported by our staff and we will contact families to explore a positive way forward.

Students, parents and staff all want consistency and high expectations and, with everyone's support and cooperation, we will achieve this with great pride.

# YEAR 11 COLLEGE PHOTOS



<p><b>ARTIFICIAL DNA HAS EIGHT LETTERS INSTEAD OF FOUR</b></p> <p>A new genetic code created by researchers uses eight different bases instead of the usual four. This extended genetic code can store information and be translated into RNA. This RNA behaves more like a protein, showing that life without proteins may be possible.</p>	<p><b>INJECTED NANOPARTICLES GIVE MICE INFRARED VISION</b></p> <p>An injection of modified nanoparticles into the eyes of mice gave them the ability to see in infrared. The nanoparticles bind to light-sensing cells in the eye, absorb infrared wavelengths, then emit visible ones. Potential future uses include treating colour blindness.</p>
<p><b>VAPING FLAVOURING CHEMICALS MAY HARM LUNG FUNCTION</b></p> <p>Diacetyl and 2,3-pentanedione, two common e-cigarette flavouring chemicals, triggered changes in human airway cells. The changes affect cells which clear dirt, mucus, and bacteria from the lungs. Manufacturers do not have to disclose chemicals used in flavourings.</p>	<p><b>MICROWAVES DECARBONISE FOSSIL FUELS &amp; MAKE HYDROGEN</b></p> <p>Microwave-absorbing iron nanoparticles can catalyse dehydrogenation of diesel oil and methane. The carbon byproduct can then be converted into useful products or stored underground. However, efficiency and deactivation of the catalyst is a problem.</p>
<p><b>HARVESTING DISSOLVED URANIUM FROM SEAWATER</b></p> <p>The world's oceans contain 4 billion tons of dissolved uranium, but it's at such a low concentration that it's difficult to extract. A new absorbent material uses a chelating agent which grabs uranium from seawater while leaving behind interfering vanadium ions.</p>	<p><b>INGESTIBLE DEVICE INJECTS INSULIN INTO STOMACH LINING</b></p> <p>Diabetics usually inject insulin as it is poorly absorbed and too easily broken down in the stomach. A new ingestible device injects insulin directly into the stomach lining before leaving the body harmlessly. It worked successfully in pigs and there are hopes for human trials.</p>
<p><b>SMART GLASS SWITCHES FROM LIGHT TO DARK IN A MINUTE</b></p> <p>A new type of smart glass based on electrochroming can switch from 75% transparency to 10% in one minute. The glass uses transparent electrodes to turn colourless dissolved bromine and copper ions black when a voltage is applied. It's both cheap and durable.</p>	<p><b>BURNED ORGANIC MATTER COULD BE NEW FERTILISER SOURCE</b></p> <p>Burned organic matter could convert ammonia pollution into fertilisers. A new study found that it adsorbed significant amounts of ammonia, and this increased as acid when it was artificially weathered. It may play a role in the global nitrogen cycle.</p>

## THE CHEMISTRY OF DAFFODILS

Daffodils are one of the characteristic flowers of spring. Here, we examine the chemical compounds behind their aroma and color as well as some beneficial and not-so-beneficial ingredients.

### AROMA COMPOUNDS IN DAFFODILS

(E)- $\beta$ -OCIMENE

The aroma of daffodils is caused by a mixture of organic compounds. One of the primary constituents is (E)- $\beta$ -ocimene, which has a woody, floral smell. Other minor constituents include (E)- $\alpha$ -farnesene (apple aroma) and 1,4-dimethoxybenzene (sweet aroma).

The color-causing compounds in daffodils are carotenoids. These include  $\beta$ -carotene, the chemical that also gives carrots their orange color, and zeaxanthin, a yellow pigment.

Daffodils contain several poisonous alkaloid compounds, including lycorine. When these are ingested, they can cause severe vomiting and diarrhea. The alkaloid galantamine, however, has been used to treat the symptoms of Alzheimer's disease.
