Dear Parents and Carers,

Further to HM Government's announcement yesterday that the current social distancing measures must remain in place for at least the next 3 weeks, I write again in a spirit of support and community, and to provide you with some updates.

Firstly, may I sincerely thank parents and carers very, very much for the many kind messages we have received. I am glad that parents and carers are finding these communications useful and I will, of course, continue to provide them. In these volatile days of uncertainty and anxiety, rife with speculation about what's going to happen next, and when, working together in support of our common goal that is the safety, wellbeing and educational development of your children, has never been more important. The spirit of community that is central to our work has never held such weight. Everyone, parents and carers, students and staff, are dealing with a range of concerns, emotions, pressures and anxieties, and whilst as a College we are endeavouring to retain some semblance of normality for our students — encouraging and helping them to keep a focus on their learning; to retain some semblance of structure, habit and rhythm that will support their eventual return to school — we know that these are not, by any stretch of the imagination, normal times.

There has been much speculation in the media recently about schools reopening. I can assure you that we will continue to ensure that you are fully informed with *the facts*, as and when they become known to us, and we will not add any more uncertainty to these already uncertain times by participating in such speculation. Some of the headlines and commentaries do not reflect the reality of the situation for schools, a reality that requires very careful thinking and about how the risks associated with reopening schools will be managed — the first principle of which will be the safety and wellbeing of students and staff. We are, of course, not responsible for the decision about when schools should reopen; this is a public health decision made by public health experts and we will continue to follow their advice. It is important to remember, nonetheless, that these decisions are dictated by the scientific evidence about the impact of the virus, and whilst we are of course looking forward to reopening and welcoming all our students back, please be under no doubt, our immediate focus must be on looking after each other, and, without hyperbole, saving lives. The Department for Education has made it clear that '[t]he coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak is expected to continue having a significant impact on the education system, and the country, for months to come.' As such, we must make sure that the current provision of remote learning activities for students is helpful, manageable and sustainable, for us as teachers and for you and your child(ren).

Supporting Remote Learning

Further to my letter of 14 April, where I outlined for you feedback from parents and carers and students' 'keeping in touch' surveys, and the actions we are taking as a result to try and help students and families from being or feeling overwhelmed with remote learning, teachers should now, in short:

• Use Class Charts as the sole vehicle with students and families for the setting of work.

• Provide work, advice and/or instructions for each lesson, and ensure that this will only appear on Class Charts on the day their lessons are timetabled.

We will be issuing our second 'keeping in touch' survey soon, to ascertain again if there are further improvements we can make in supporting you and your child(ren) while this period of temporary school closures continues. In the meantime, I thought it may also be useful to offer a little advice about the use of Class Charts for parents and carers, so have attached at the end of this letter the relevant pages from the 'Class Charts for Parents Guide.' In addition, please remember that simply altering the settings on Class Charts might also help:

- When you open Class Charts and click/tap on 'Homework: To-do', tasks are shown in order of their
 due date, with the task with the nearest due date listed first. If you click/tap on 'Show by issue
 date', tasks will be arranged in order of the date they have been issued.
- If you then click/tap on the calendar icon, choose 'Custom' from the menu, and click/tap on the date range, you can choose for what date you wish to see tasks. For example, if you only wanted to see tasks issued on or still 'live' for today, 17 April, you would click/tap twice on 17 April.

As we progress, and as we iron out the issues that we are all learning about and from, I think and hope you will see an improvement in your — and your child(ren)'s — ability to manage expectation and workload, which will, in turn, remove or at least reduce any stresses that may inadvertently be caused by our ongoing professional commitment to provide all our students with effective remote learning opportunities.

GCSE, AS and A-Level grades, and Vocational and Technical qualifications summer 2020

The Department for Education confirmed yesterday, that A Level students will receive their results on Thursday 13 August, and GCSE students will receive theirs on Thursday 20 August, as originally planned. We will of course write to you again to confirm details about those days.

Ofqual, the independent qualifications regulator, have now confirmed that vocational qualifications, including the Cambridge Nationals and BTecs etc. that several of our students have been working towards, will be 'treated in the same way as GCSEs, AS and A levels, with learners receiving a calculated result'. As such, and for the avoidance of doubt, it is worth reiterating Ofqual's statement here that whilst any 'completed, or nearly completed, non-exam assessments' will be 'helpful to schools and colleges in deciding each student's centre assessed grades and rank order... [schools] should not ask students to complete their non-exam assessment work and [schools will] not need to submit marks for any completed non-exam assessment.'

On 15 April Ofqual opened a consultation to seek views of 'everyone with an interest' about the 'exceptional arrangements' introduced for awarding GCSEs, AS and A levels in 2020. The consultation closes at 11:45pm on 29 April 2020. Progression to Post-16 study for Y11 students

Due to our closure, our Post-16 team were unable to hold their planned meetings with Y11 students who have applied to join our sixth form. Most of these calls will be made on Tuesday 21 April. To change the date range for displayed homework tasks, click on the Date button to select from the available presets or create your own custom date range.


To display tasks in the order they were set, click on the Issue Date button


